In a Hawaii hellscape, taking stock

The cause of the Maui blazes — now the second-deadliest wildfire outbreak in modern U.S. history — remains under investigation. That probe may take weeks or even months to produce official findings, and on Friday, Hawaii Attorney General Anne Lopez (D) announced a “comprehensive review” of the decisions and policies surrounding the fires.
